JOSEPH JACOBSON

Kidnapped once

Sold twice

Framed

Imprisoned



Joseph's master took him and put him in prison, the place where the king's prisoners were confined. But while Joseph was there in the prison, the Lord was with him: he showed him kindness (loving kindness) and granted him favor in the eyes of the prison warden. Genesis 39: 20-21 NIV



The captain of the guard assigned them to Joseph, and he attended them. After they had been in custody for some time, each of the two men – the cupbearer (butler) and the baker ... had a dream the same night and each dream had a meaning of its own. Genesis 40: 4-5 NIV



"Why do you look so sad today?" "We both had dreams," they answered, "but there is no one to interpret." Then Joseph said to them, "Do not interpretations belong to God? Tell me your dreams." Genesis 40: 7b-8 NIV



So the chief cupbearer told Joseph his dream. He said to him, "In my dream I saw a vine in front of me, and on the vine were three branches." "This is what it means," Joseph said to him. "The three branches are three days. Within three days Pharaoh will lift up your head and restore you to your position, ..."

Genesis 40: 9-10a, 12-13a NIV

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"But when it goes well with you, remember me and show me kindness; mention me to Pharaoh and get me out of this prison. I was forcibly carried off from the land of the Hebrews and even here I have done nothing to deserve being put in a dungeon." Genesis 40: 14-15 NIV

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When the chief baker saw that Joseph had given a favorable interpretation, he said to Joseph, *"I too had a dream*: On my head were three baskets of bread. ..." "This is what it means," Joseph said. "The three baskets are three days. Within three days Pharaoh will lift off your head and impale your body on a pole. And the birds will eat away your flesh." Genesis 40: 16, 18-19 NIV S

Now the third day was Pharaoh's birthday, and he gave a feast for all his officials. He lifted up the heads of the chief cupbearer and the chief baker. ... He restored the chief cupbearer to his position, ... - but he impaled the chief baker, just as Joseph said to them in his interpretation. The chief cupbearer, however, did not remember Joseph; he forgot him. Genesis 40: 20-23 NIV

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When two full years had passed Pharaoh had a dream ... woke up ... fell asleep again and had a second dream: ... Pharaoh said to Joseph, "I had a dream, and no one can interpret it. But I have heard it said of you that when you hear a dream you can interpret it" "I cannot do it," Joseph replied to Pharaoh, "but God will give Pharaoh the answer he desires." Genesis 41: 1a, 7b, 15-16 NIV S

"... God has shown Pharaoh what he is about to do. Seven years of great abundance are coming throughout the land of Egypt, but seven years of famine will follow them. Then Pharaoh said to Joseph, "Since God has made all this known to you, there is no one so discerning and wise as you. Only with respect to the throne will I be greater than you."

Genesis 41: 28b-30a, 39-40 NIV



Joseph was thirty years old when he entered the service of Pharaoh ... Joseph stored up huge quantities of grain, like the sand of the sea: it was so much that he stopped keeping records because it was beyond measure. ... The seven years of abundance came to an end, and the seven years of famine began, just as Joseph had said."

Genesis 41: 46, 49, 53-54 NIV



When Jacob learned that there was grain in Egypt, he said to his sons (eleven), "Why do you just keep looking at each other?" Now Joseph was the governor of the land, the person who sold grain to all its people, So when Joseph's brothers (eleven) arrived, they bowed down to him with their faces to the ground. As soon as Joseph saw his brothers, he recognized them, but he pretended to be a stranger ... Π Genesis 42: 1, 6-7a NIV S F

"I am Joseph! Is my father still alive?" But his brothers were not able to answer him, because they were terrified at his presence. "Come close to me." When they had done so, he said, "I am your brother Joseph, the one you sold into Egypt!" And now, do not be distressed and do not be angry with yourselves for selling me here, because it was to save lives God sent me ahead of you."

Genesis 45: 3-5 NIV

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His brothers then came and threw themselves down before him. "We are your slaves," they said. But Joseph said to them, "Don't be afraid. Am I in the place of God? You intended to harm me, but God intended it for good to accomplish what is now being done the saving of many lives."
